

WHY GO TO COLLEGE?

Take a minute to envision where you want to be 10 years from now. What career path or job do you want? What will your family life look like? Post-secondary education is the success factor for many people and can be one of the most important decisions you can make for your future.




KNOW WHAT YOU NE

Earn credits as required by the New Mexico Public Education Department



Earning your high school diploma is one of the most important academic milestones of your lifetime. A high school diploma allows you to access higher education, and your academic performance can determine which schools you can attend as well as how much money you can receive to pay for college. Colleges across New Mexico have varying entrance requirements. Starting on page 19, you will find more information about each college. Some colleges require only a high school diploma while others have standards related to GPA and test scores. In addition to your core requirements, you will need to successfully complete statewide assessments. Learn whether your school offers dual credit or Advanced Placement (AP) courses which can give you a head start on earning college credits while still in high school.



Ask adults around you about their careers. *What do you like about your job? Does your job require a specific kind of degree? What kind of degree or certification do you have?*



Attend a college fair.

Ask a counselor to connect you with alumni from your high school who attend the colleges you are interested in visiting.

Get Organized for Your Senior Year



Finalize the list of colleges you plan to visit and apply to.



Ask 3-4 adults (teachers, mentors, bosses, etc.) to consider writing you a letter of recommendation for scholarships.

Determine which classes you still need in order to be college-ready.

Shadow professionals in the career fields you are interested in possibly pursuing.

Finalize your *STUDENT LEADERSHIP PROFILE* (found on page 57) at the end of the year.





Stay Focused

Work with your school counselor to ensure that you are upholding NMPED graduation requirements using your **NEXT STEP PLAN TEMPLATE** on page 6.

Finish the year strong. The college or university you are planning to attend will require a copy of your final transcript, which includes grades from your senior year.

Take the right math class for your chosen path of study.

Add important due dates to your planner or calendar. You may want to include:

- O College application deadlines
- O Scholarship deadlines
- ACT/SAT test dates
- FAFSA (October 1 is usually the first day to apply!)
- O College visit dates

Ask for letters of recommendation from teachers, advisors, bosses, etc.

Apply for College

Submit your college applications with time to spare. Application fee waivers may be available. Check with your high school counselor for more information.



Check with colleges about their ACT/SAT requirements and whether improving your score may mean access to more scholarship money.



Confirm online, over the phone, or with a counselor whether a college requires a secondary application for scholarships.

Complete Your Financial Aid Documents



Complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid).

Even if you do not think you will qualify for federal financial aid, many colleges require the FAFSA for scholarship eligibility. If you are undocumented, consult with the school you plan to attend for aid information and read page 70 for more information.



Check with your counselor about FAFSA completion resources and if your school is planning to host a FAFSA night for families.



Calculate Your College Costs

In the spring, review your award letters from the colleges you have been accepted to and add in any scholarship money you have received to calculate your out of pocket costs.

Continue to apply for scholarships.

Continue contributing to your 529 account at *THEEDUCATIONPLAN.COM* (see page 67).

Evaluate your loan options.

CERTIFICATES

Certificates are short-term training programs for vocational careers most common in healthcare, IT and administration.

AVERAGE COMPLETION TIMELINE: Weeks - 1 year

EXAMPLES OF CAREER PATHS: Dental Assistant, Medical Technicians, Plumber, HVAC Installer, Cosmetologist



ASSOCIATE DEGREES

There are two types of associate degrees: Associate of Applied Science - for students who intend to enter the workforce immediately following graduation, and Associate of Science/Associate of Arts - for students who plan to transfer from a community college to a 4-year school to obtain a bachelor's degree.

AVERAGE COMPLETION TIMELINE: 2 years

EXAMPLES OF CAREER PATHS: Law Enforcement, Web Developer, Paralegal, Construction, Dental Hygienist



BACHELOR'S DEGREES

These degrees provide a balance of core classes, major requirements and electives in preparation for a career or graduate degree.

AVERAGE COMPLETION TIMELINE: 4 years

EXAMPLES OF CAREER PATHS: Business, Engineering, History, Teaching, Healthcare

GRADUATE & PROFESSIONAL DEGREES

This category includes degrees beyond a bachelor's for advanced study including master's, Ph.D, MD, JD, etc. Students pursuing advanced degrees may focus on a specific topic and/or research.

AVERAGE COMPLETION TIMELINE: 1 - 6 years

EXAMPLES OF CAREER PATHS: Medical field, Professor/Higher Education, Law, Business, Architecture

WISITING A COLLEGE CAMPUS



A school might look great on paper, but before you make a final decision, it is recommended that you make an official visit to learn more about the "feel" of the school. However, it may be challenging and expensive to visit every school on your wish list. After you have narrowed down your choices, spend some time on the campuses you are most likely to attend.



BEFORE YOU GO...

- Research the school's website.
- Make an appointment to meet with your admissions counselor. Come prepared with questions that demonstrate your interest in the school and how seriously you are taking this process.
- Sign up for an official campus tour.
- If you have a major you are interested in, contact the college for an information session. An official campus tour will give you an overall experience. Connecting with the college (or department) for your intended major will give you a better perspective on your coursework.
- Make a list of questions for both current students and staff members.
- Print a campus map.



QUESTIONS ABOUT COSTS + FINANCIAL AID...

- What is the cost of attending school here?
- What other costs should I budget for?
- What types of financial aid are available for students and how do I apply?
- Are scholarships available after freshman year?
- How do I apply for university-specific scholarships?



QUESTIONS ABOUT CLASSES + SCHEDULING...

- How do I pick a major? Do I have to declare it ahead of time or can I pick it after taking a few classes?
- When do you register for classes? How do you register for classes?
- Are new students given an academic advisor?
- How easy is it to meet with professors?
- Who teaches the introductory classes?
- Are there tutoring services?
- Will my credits transfer from a community college?



QUESTIONS ABOUT HOUSING...

- Are first-year students required to live in the residence halls? Where else do freshmen live?
- What is on-campus food like? How does a meal plan work?
- Do most students live on or off-campus?
- How will I be assigned a roommate? Can I request to room with a friend?
- How much does it cost to bring my car? Where do I park my car? How do you suggest getting around campus and getting around the area?

- What are popular activities to get involved in?
- Do students attend sporting events? How do I get tickets?
- Where can I find more information about clubs and involvement opportunities?

EVALUATING YOUR SCHOOL CHOICES

Starting your search early gives you time to evaluate and narrow down your potential schools. It is recommended to **create a list of 3-5 schools**. This should include a "dream" school and several "good fits" where you are confident in being accepted.

Plan to visit schools before you submit your applications. Many schools require an application fee. Save your money and only apply to the schools that you think will be a good fit for you and that you are likely to attend.

OTHER THINGS TO INCLUDE ON YOUR VISIT:

Tour the community – Find out what there is to do outside of class including touring points of interest and eating at local restaurants. While you will spend a large amount of time on or near campus, it's important to experience what a community has to offer.

Sit in on a class or meet a professor – College classes are usually larger than a class in high school. If you are graduating from a small school and headed to a large university, it's likely you may have a few classes with more students in one room than your entire graduating class. It might be intimidating to visit a lecture, but it will provide a good preview of your life as a college student.

Spend time in the student union – This is a common gathering place for students. Watch how students interact with each other and get a feel for the general student population and campus culture.



TYPES OF COLLEGE VISITS

Individual Visit: This is your best opportunity to make a personal connection with the college. You will have the opportunity for one-on-one time with admissions, financial aid, and the tour guide. It can be easier to get a meeting with someone in the department of your prospective major as well as sit in on a class. This also allows you to decide on the college without any interruptions.

Group Visit: Tour the campus in a small group setting with other prospective students that you may or may not know. This visit can be less personal but still offers plenty of opportunities to stand out. If there is anything specific (i.e.: a department, a specific program, etc.) that you want to learn more about when on campus, make sure to submit that request before the visit.

School Visit: Visit the school on a class trip or school or organization sponsored trip. This type of visit can be challenging because other students may be less interested in this school and can cause distractions. Make sure you sit in the front of the room and take notes during the presentation and tour. Stand up and introduce yourself before asking a question. This will help set you apart from the rest of the group.

Open House: This format often includes large group presentations, inviting students from all over the country. Since the college is hosting and trying to attract as many applicants as possible, everything is top notch and extra polished, so keep that in mind when you're on campus. Because of the large number of students, there are usually no opportunities for one-on-one interaction. Use tips from the "School Visit" section above to stand out during an Open House visit.




The SAT is the official statewide standardized test for high school juniors in the state of New Mexico. All New Mexico colleges and universities accept this test, as do all out-of-state schools if they require a standardized test. Each college has their own SAT score required for admission and this may change on an annual basis based on the strength of the incoming class. Your score may determine your eligibility for admission and access to scholarship money.

SAT FACTS & OVERVIEW

- > A calculator is permitted in designated parts of the Math section. Be prepared to do mental math.
- Questions start easiest to hardest except Reading and Grammar sections. Spend your time getting easy and medium questions right.
- Plan to take the SAT 2-3 times starting your junior year.
- Fee waivers are available. Talk to your guidance/college counselor.
- You can score up to a 1600.
- A college-ready Math score is considered: 530+.
- A college-ready Reading & Writing score is considered: 480+.

IS THIS COLLEGE A GOOD FIT FOR YOU?

You'll need to understand how your high school grade point average (GPA), your college entrance exam scores (SAT and/or ACT), and the courses you've taken in high school match the college's entrance requirements AND the average GPAs and scores of students admitted. Remember that what a school requires could differ from the averages of who they accept. You should plan to apply to at least four schools, making sure you have applications going to each of the following types of schools:



"Reach School" does not mean out of reach, it just means that the school may be more selective (look at the percent of applicants admitted) and your academic record may be on the lower end of what the college typically accepts. In other words, you may be admitted to this school. We recommend applying to at least 1-2 reach schools

MATCH

Typically, at a match school, your academic record will be similar to the "average" student admitted to this school. In other words, you are likely to be admitted. We recommend applying to at least 1-2 match schools.



A safety school will usually have either open enrollment (meaning anyone who submits a completed application is admitted) or will be considered a "less selective" institution Your academic record will exceed the institution's requirements and averages for students admitted. In other words, you will almost definitely be admitted. We recommend applying to at least 1 safety school.


MEDIAN USUAL WEEKLY EARNINGS

TYPES OF FINANCIAL AID

GRANTS

Need-based money without repayment, like the Pell Grant and Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants (FSEOG).

SCHOLARSHIPS

Money without repayment that may be awarded based on merit or performance like the New Mexico Lottery and Opportunity Scholarships.

FEDERAL WORK STUDY

Need-based campus job. Earnings paid directly to students as wages.

STATE WORK STUDY

Employment opportunities for qualified resident students attending New Mexico public colleges or universities.

FEDERAL LOANS

Fixed low interest money that has to be paid back.

STATE LOANS

Students should contact their financial aid office to find out which loans they qualify for.

FAFSA CHECKLIST

EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO COMPLETE THE FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is your ticket to federal grants, scholarships, work study, and more. Most colleges award aid on a first-come, first-served basis. The FAFSA opens annually, usually on October 1. Be sure to check college-specific FAFSA deadlines. You are strongly encouraged to complete the FAFSA as soon as possible to receive the maximum federal and state aid for which you may qualify. You will need to complete the FAFSA for every year you are in college.

Visit STUDENTAID.GOV/H/APPLY-FOR-AID/FAFSA to fill out your FAFSA.

The FAFSA is dependent on your parent/guardian tax information unless a waiver is filed to gain independent student status.

PERSONAL DOCUMENTS & INFORMATION

- Federal Student Aid Account ID (FSA ID) you will need to create this to start the process
- > Your legal name, Social Security Number*, date of birth, and email address are required

FSA ID for any parents/guardians invited to your form, known as "contributors"

- Contributors need their legal name, date of birth, email address, and SSN if applicable
- > *If not a U.S. Citizen, you will need their U.S. Permanent Resident Card or Arrival-Departure Record

PROOF OF INCOME & ASSETS

- Taxable income from two years prior (W-2 forms or other records of money earned/received)
- Untaxed income, including workers' compensation, child support, housing, etc.
- Bank statements and records of investments (if applicable)





NEW MEXICO SCHOLARSHIPS

THE BRIDGE SCHOLARSHIP

The 3% (The Bridge) Scholarship supplements the cost of tuition for the first academic semester prior to being awarded the Lottery Scholarship. Students apply for this scholarship by contacting the institution they plan to attend.

ELIGIBILITY

- Student must be a resident of New Mexico.
- Must have graduated from a New Mexico public or accredited private high school.
- Check with your college for specific details.

THE LEGISLATIVE LOTTERY SCHOLARSHIP

This scholarship covers partial to full tuition at any public 4-year or 2-year college in New Mexico. For more information, visit **www.hed.state.nm.us.** The initial scholarship shall begin with the second semester of enrollment at a public postsecondary educational institution. Thereafter, the scholarship is renewed on a per-semester basis subject to maintaining eligibility. Students must remain consecutively enrolled each fall and spring semester to maintain eligibility for the scholarship. The scholarship may be renewed at a four-year institution until the award recipient has received seven (7) semesters of scholarship awards or until the student graduates with a bachelor's degree, whichever is sooner. Students attending a community college are eligible for three (3) semesters of scholarship awards. The student should contact their public post-secondary educational institution's financial aid advisor for eligibility verification if they have met the first semester eligibility requirements listed above. Student must enroll no later than 16 months following high school graduation to be eligible.

SCHOLARSHIP FACTS

- To qualify, you must be a resident of New Mexico and have graduated from a New Mexico high school or received a HSE while a resident.
- Students must maintain credit hour and GPA requirements every semester.
- To apply, submit an application at the college. You do not have to complete the FAFSA to receive this award or demonstrate financial need.
- At a 4-year New Mexico public college: Earn 15 credit hours/semester.
- At a 2-year New Mexico community college: Earn 12 credit hours/semester.
- · Students with disabilities may qualify for reduced credit hour requirements and additional semesters of the scholarship
- Covers tuition only. The award amount varies by institution.

NEW MEXICO OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIP

The Opportunity Scholarship covers tuition and required fees for eligible New Mexico residents pursuing career training certificates, associate degrees, and bachelor's degrees at New Mexico public colleges and universities.

SCHOLARSHIP FACTS

- Enroll in at least 6 credit hours at a public college or university.
- Credits must be in a training or degree program.
- Must enroll each consecutive semester.
- Maintain a cumulative 2.5 GPA.
- There is no application process and the college will contact you directly.
- Plan to apply for the FAFSA to receive additional financial aid.
- You can still receive other financial aid + scholarships to cover books, room + board, meals, supplies, etc.
- There is no income threshold to receive this scholarship.
- Available to part-time and full time students.

SCHOLARSHIPS



Scholarships are available to every student. The best part of scholarships is that you can apply for as many as you want and some applications are open throughout your high school years!

TIPS FOR FINDING SCHOLARSHIPS

- Explore options at your school by talking with your counselor and/or college access advisor. Find out if and where they post available scholarships.
- Explore national scholarships and create profiles on search websites such as:
 - **BIGFUTURE.COLLEGEBOARD.ORG**
 - CHEGG.COM
 - **FASTWEB.COM**
- Research college websites to see if they have scholarships available and how students can apply for them. Some schools require you only to submit the FAFSA and others require a separate application.
- Check with local organizations you are involved in including your church, sports leagues and even your parent/guardian's employer to see if they offer scholarships.
- Be aware of scholarship deadlines.
- Apply. Apply. Apply. You can apply for an unlimited amount, even after you have exceeded your expected costs!
- Submit the FAFSA. Many scholarship programs require this step.

FINANCIAL AID for undocumented students

The State of New Mexico offers in-state tuition and state aid to undocumented and non-resident students. To be eligible:

Students must have attended a New Mexico middle or high school for at least one year
 Graduated from a New Mexico high school or received a HSE in the state of New Mexico

TO APPLY FOR AID

Many colleges have the aid application listed on their website. Inquire with a financial aid advisor at the college you plan to attend to receive an application.

PRIVATE LOANS

Another option for undocumented students is to take out private loans directly from lenders. There are many reputable lenders who offer loans for students. Some may require a cosigner that is a U.S. Citizen.

Check out the New Mexico Educational Assistance Foundation (NMEAF), **NMEAF.ORG**, for additional information.

STUDENT CRESOURCES

Even before stepping foot onto a college campus, students can find an incredible amount of support from various departments and programs. Ask any current student or college graduate, they will tell you that a key to being successful in college is to know your resources and when to seek out help.

TRIO-SSS

TRIO-Student Support Services (SSS) is a program available to students who are first-generation, low-income and/or have a documented disability. Support is offered through academic advising, tutoring, mentoring, career advisement, personal guidance, financial guidance, graduate school guidance, workshops and social/cultural events. Students must apply for this program and space is based on eligible funds. Contact the TRIO office at each school to apply. See the sidebar for schools with TRIO-SSS programs. **TRIONEWMEXICO.COM**

FINANCIAL AID

Each college campus has a financial aid office with advisors to help you fill out your FAFSA, receive aid disbursements, explore scholarships and more.

ACADEMIC ADVISING

All students receive an academic advisor in college to help you navigate which classes to take each semester and to stay on track in order to graduate on time. It's suggested you meet with your academic advisor at least once a semester.

ACADEMIC RESOURCES

If you need extra help in your classes, there are a number of resources on campus to help you and they are all free!

Writing Resource Center - From essays, lab reports, research papers to presentations, speeches, cover letters, and personal statements; this resource is invaluable to students at any level.

Math Tutoring - This resource is available for students not just taking math, but also classes like physics, engineering, statistics and more. Whether it's an assignment to test prep to a single problem, you can find a tutor to help you.

ACCESSIBILITY SERVICES

This office supports students who have both physical and/or learning disabilities and connects them to the resources they need in order to be successful.

ACADEMIC ADVISOR/COUNSELOR

This person will help you select the correct courses, review the course requirements in the field you have selected to pursue and help you with any academic problems you may encounter.

ALUMNI

People who have graduated from the institution.

ACT AND SAT

These letters are acronyms for the American College Test and the Scholastic Aptitude Test. Both tests are designed to measure a student's level of knowledge in basic areas such as math, science, English and social studies. Colleges may require the results of either the ACT or SAT before granting admission.

ASSOCIATE DEGREE

The associate degree is granted upon completion of a program of at least two, but less than four years of college work.

BACHELOR'S DEGREE

This is the undergraduate degree offered by four-year colleges and universities. The Bachelor of Arts degree requires that a significant portion of the student's studies be dedicated to the arts - literature, language, music, etc. The Bachelor of Science degree requires that a significant portion of the studies be in the sciences - chemistry, biology, math, etc.

CATALOG

College catalogs provide all types of information about a school. It lists, for example: the institution's history and philosophy, policies and procedures, its accreditation status, courses of study, degrees and certificates offered, physical facilities, admission and enrollment procedures, financial aid, student life activities, etc.

COLLEGE

A college is an institution of higher education that grants degrees and certificates. The term is also used to designate the organizational units of a university such as the College of Education or the College of Engineering.

COMMUTER

A commuter is a student who lives off-campus and drives to class, or commutes.

CREDIT HOURS

Courses taken in college are measured in terms of credit hours. To earn one credit hour, a student must attend a class for one classroom hour (usually 50 minutes) per week for the whole semester (usually 16 weeks). Classes are offered in 1 to 5 credit hour increments, and sometimes larger amounts.

CURRICULUM

A curriculum is composed of those classes prescribed or outlined by an institution for completion of a program of study leading to a degree or certificate.

DEPARTMENT

A department is the basic organizational unit in a higher education institution, and is responsible for the academic functions in a field of study.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

These are non-classroom activities that can contribute to a well-rounded education. They can include such activities as athletics, clubs, student government, recreational and social organizations and events.

FACULTY

The faculty is composed of all persons who teach classes for colleges.

FAFSA (FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID)

The almost universal application for financial aid, including loans, grants, college work-study and other federal and state programs. Often also required before a student can be considered for scholarships.

FEES

Fees are additional charges not included in tuition. Fees may be charged to cover the cost of materials and equipment needed in certain courses. They may also be assessed for student events, programs, and publications.

FINAL EXAMS (FINALS)

These exams are usually given during the last week of classes each semester. The type of final administered in a course is left to the discretion of the instructor. Final exams are given on specified dates that may be different than the regular class time, and are usually listed in each semester's class schedule.

FINANCIAL AID

Aid is made available from grants, scholarships, loans, and part-time employment from federal, state, institutional, and private sources. Awards from these programs may be combined in an "award package" to meet the cost of education. The types and amounts of aid awarded are determined by financial need, available funds, student classification, academic performance, and sometimes the timeliness of application.

FRATERNITIES/SORORITIES (ALSO CALLED THE GREEK SYSTEM)

Fraternities (for men) and sororities (for women) are social organizations that are active in various activities. Through a process of mutual selection, called Rush (which takes place during a specified period of time), students may be offered the opportunity to "pledge" a certain fraternity of sorority. Not all colleges have these organizations.

FULL-TIME ENROLLMENT/PART-TIME ENROLLMENT

A full-time student is enrolled in 12 or more credit hours in a semester (fulltime status for a Summer term is usually 6 credit hours). A part-time student is enrolled in less than 12 credit hours in a semester (less than 6 in a Summer term).

JUNIOR/COMMUNITY COLLEGE

A Junior/Community College is a twoyear institution of higher education. Course offerings generally include a transfer curriculum with credits transferable toward a bachelor's degree at a four-year college, and an occupational or technical curriculum with courses of study designed to prepare students for employment in two years.

LECTURE/LABORATORY/ DISCUSSION CLASSES

In lecture classes, students attend class on a regular basis and the instructor lectures on class material. Laboratory classes require students to perform certain functions in controlled situations that help them test and understand what is being taught in the lecture. Discussion classes offer students the opportunity to talk about material being taught, ask questions, and discuss material with their classmates. Discussion classes are often taught by master's or Doctoral students, and are becoming more common on college campuses.

LETTER GRADES/GRADE POINT AVERAGES (GPA)

Most colleges use both letter grades and GPAs in determining students' grades. Grades at most colleges are figured using the following method: As are worth 4 points Bs are worth 3 points Cs are worth 2 points Ds are worth 1 point Fs are worth 0 points To figure a GPA, simply multiply the number of hours a course is worth by the number of points for the letter grade, then add up the totals for each course and divide by the number of credit hours. The result is the grade point average.

MAJOR/MINOR

A major is a student's chosen field of study. It usually requires the successful completion of a specified number of credit hours. A minor is designated as a specific number of credit hours in a secondary field of study.

MID-TERM EXAMS (MIDTERMS)

During the middle of each semester, instructors may give mid-term exams that test students on the material covered during the first half of the semester. Some classes have only two tests, a midterm and a final.

NON-CREDIT COURSES

These are classes or courses that do not meet the requirements for a certificate of a degree at a given institution. Noncredit courses may serve one of several purposes: to explore new fields of study, increase proficiency in a particular profession, develop potential or enrich life experiences through cultural and/or recreational studies.

OPEN-DOOR INSTITUTION

Open-door institutions are usually public two-year junior/community colleges. The term open-door refers to an admission policy that states that anyone who is 18 years of age or older, whether or not a high school graduate, can be admitted to that college.

PREREQUISITE COURSES

A prerequisite course is a course taken in preparation for another course. For example, Accounting 1 is a prerequisite for Accounting 2.

PRIVATE/PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS

Private and public institutions differ primarily in terms of their source of financial support. Public institutions receive funding from the state or other governmental entities and are administered by public boards. Private institutions rely on income from private donations, or from religious or other organizations and student tuition. Private institutions are governed by a board of trustees.

SYLLABUS

An outline of the important information about a course. Written by the professor or instructor, it usually includes important dates, assignments, expectations and policies specific to that course. Some are quite lengthy.

TEXTBOOKS

Books required of students enrolled in college classes. Professors notify students which books they must purchase (and sometimes additional, optional textbooks) at the beginning of each semester/class. Students can purchase new or used textbooks, or rent textbooks.

TRANSFER OF CREDITS

Some students attend more than one institution during their college career. When they move or transfer from one college to another, they also transfer accumulated credit hours from the former institution to the new one. The new institution determines which courses will apply toward graduation requirements.

TUITION

Tuition is the amount paid for each credit hour of enrollment. Tuition does not include the cost of books, fees, or room and board. Tuition charges vary from college to college and are dependent on such factors as resident or out-of-state status, level of classes enrolled in (lower, upper or graduate division), and whether the institution is publicly or privately financed.

UNDERGRADUATE

An undergraduate is a student who is pursuing either a one-, two-, or fouryear degree.

UNIVERSITY

A university is composed of undergraduate, graduate, and professional colleges and offers degrees in each.
