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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The New Mexico Higher Education Department (HED) seeks to promote accessibility to education for all New Mexicans and Information technology is a key element of this effort. Some of the areas in which IT is utilized are managing loan applications for Financial Aid, providing collaborative tools for teleworking, serving archived school transcripts for students, and delivering data for policy makers.

The Information Technology Services Division (ITS) helps facilitate the workflow of other HED divisions and enhance the overall efficiency of the agency. ITS's work and goals are in alignment with the Higher Education Department's and the State's IT strategic goals. Specifically:

ITS is working to improve security and functionality by activating firewalls on user systems and upgrading MS Office 2019 to MS Office 365. Additionally, we continue to add features and improve performance of the Financial Aid Division's Health Professional Loan Repayment Program application (HPLRP), the NM Children, Youth & Families Worker Loan Repayment Program application (CYFD) as well as Planning & Research Division's Electronic Data Editing and Reporting system (eDEAR). Finally, ITS successfully developed and deployed the Academic Policy application for the Academic Affairs and Policy Division, allowing Higher Education Institutions to more easily and securely submit CIP Code, General Education or New Education Program requests.

Regarding inter-agency activity, ITS continues to work with the CIOs of all the New Mexico Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) on cybersecurity, especially on ransomware prevention and mitigation. Additionally, we are a key stakeholder on the New Mexico Longitudinal Data System project (NMLDS), which is a collaboration between DWS, ECECD, PED, and HED through participation on the Project Team, securing state and federal funding, and evaluating vendor solutions. This certified project is transitioning to the Planning Phase this autumn and will be in the Implementation Phase in in early FY23. As such, much of ITS resources will be devoted to it in FY23.

Agency leadership continues to make it a priority to (a) better engage and support the State's higher education institutions, students and teachers and (b) more widely share the extensive information HED has collected and which ITS manages. To that end, FY23 will see (a) the delayed off-site Business Continuity and Disaster Recovery solution (BC/DR) finally placed into service and (b) the remaining onpremises services, Active Directory and shared files, migrated to a cloud-hosted platform.

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I. AGENCY OVERVIEW

A. AGENCY MISSION

The New Mexico Higher Education Department provides financial, academic, and policy oversight to the NM public higher education institutions for the purpose of promoting efficiency, accountability and student success.

B. AGENCY GOALS

HED fosters and guides a system of higher education that best meets the needs of the citizens of the state by providing financing to and oversight of all of the state's public universities and colleges. The agency also has regulatory authority over private for-profit institutions operating within the state.

C. AGENCY DESCRIPTION AND ORGANIZATION STRUCTURE

HED has a staff size of 42 and all of its offices in Santa Fe. The agency is comprised of seven main divisions that sponsor various education-related programs. These are as follows:

- 1. The <u>Adult Education Division</u> serves adults to become literate and obtain the knowledge and skills necessary for employment and self-sufficiency.
- 2. The <u>Financial Aid Division</u> is dedicated to helping students in pursuing their educational goals by educating students, parents and the community about state aid opportunities.
- 3. <u>GEAR UP</u>'s mission is to increase the number of underrepresented students who are prepared to enter and succeed in Postsecondary education.
- 4. The <u>Institutional Finance Division</u> is responsible for the fiscal oversight of 32 colleges, universities and special schools.
- 5. The <u>Academic Affairs and Policy Division</u> is involved with a number of activities, including monitoring the transfer and articulation operation and the associated General Education Core Course listings.
- 6. The <u>Private Postsecondary Schools Division</u> (PPSD) issues licenses or letters of exemptions to private postsecondary Institutions allowing these institutions to legally operate in the state.
- 7. The <u>Research and Planning Division</u> provides quality assurance, reporting and planning support to the higher education community through collaborative data collection, analysis and reporting.

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II. HED IT DIVISION

A. VISION AND PRIORITIES

To facilitate and transform the business processes of the agency and provide the highest possible value to all internal and external stakeholders.

Priorities are as follows:

- Increasing information and data redundancy and security
- Increasing information and data availability
- Streamlining service delivery
- Improving responsiveness and customer service
- Becoming more transparent to stakeholders
- Consolidating services and reducing costs via virtualization and hosting

B. IT ENVIRONMENT

1. Major Applications

Our primary applications deal with supporting NM higher education institutions directly and indirectly by (a) providing financial aid to students, teachers and graduates, (b) funding projects, (c) overseeing projects and finances, (d) managing course and program changes and standards, (e) collecting enrollment and graduation information, and (f) providing transcripts. All of these work with sensitive information. Therefore, security is the highest priority. Second highest priorities are intuitive, easy-to-use interfaces and strong customer support.

2. Infrastructure

All HED network and server systems are located at the 2044 Galisteo Street HED Office complex and are comprised of HP x64 servers, an HP SAS storage system, Juniper network switches, a Palo Alto firewall, and Ubiquiti wireless access points. We also have a growing cloud-based infrastructure that includes application containers and SQL Server database servers.

3. Security

Security is currently our highest priority and takes approximately 40% of our time. It is the first consideration when any change, purchase or request is made, and it is and has been a key driver of our move to cloud-based services. This includes redundant back-ups on and offsite, our current and planned efforts to standardize on using encrypted email and requiring multi-factor authentication on all applications and services.

Other aspects of our security include zero-trust networks, tiered Active Directory permissions, robust VPN service, and multi-level end-user protection, including local anti-malware and firewall services.

4. IT Projects

HED has one certified IT Project, the NM Longitudinal Data System (NMLDS) and one project exempted from certification by DoIT, the Shared Services Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP). Here are the details:

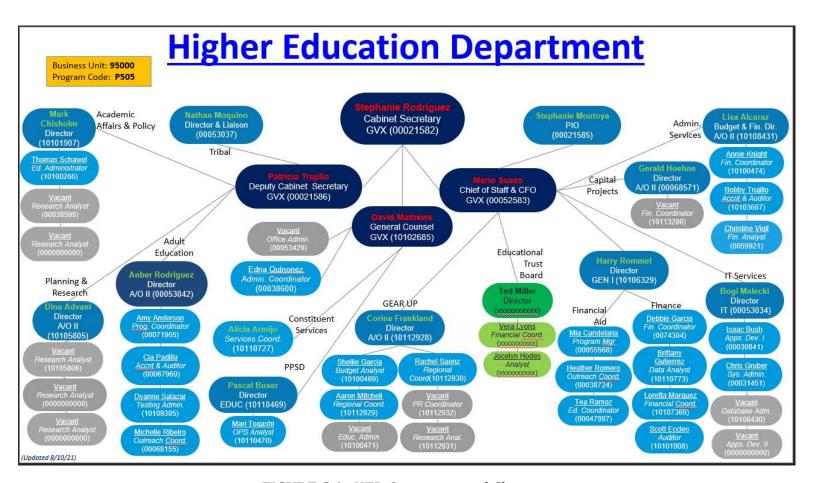


FIGURE C.1: HED Organizational Chart

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
